Intercultural competence

Markus Öbrink (Palacký University, the Czech Republic)

With the aim of helping the participants to learn how to work effectively in an intercultural environment and how to use diversity as a tool to improve the output of their work, the concept of Intercultural Communication will be discussed from several different viewpoints, based on the three components: attitudes, skills and knowledge.

From multilingualism to plurilingualism (theories and applications)

Ulrike Jessner-Schmid (Innsbruck University, Austria) and Lídia Gallego Balsà (University of Rovira i Virgili, Spain)

In this seminar the concepts of multi- and plurilingualism will be addressed with a focus on individual, social and educational dimensions of the phenomena that have been discussed in interdisciplinary approaches stemming from several fields, such as psychology, sociology, ethnology, (applied) linguistics and education.

Linguistic diversity and European Identity

Alessandro Arienzo (University of Naples Federico II, Italy)

This seminar will explore how the acquisition of European identity is based on the development of plurilingual competence so Europeans can interact with members of other states. Also, the participants will reflect upon their own linguistic diversity and the values they ascribe to it.
